This presentation will share promising fungicide trial results so all conventional growers can benefit from improved ALS control in their cole crops.

Spotted Lantern Fly poses a serious risk to orchard, grape, maple, hops, and forestry products. New York State has established quarantine protocols on goods coming from Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Virginia to try to stop the introduction of this invasive pest. Learn how to identify and report Spotted Lantern Fly, what goods and counties are impacted by the quarantine, and what paperwork you must request when procuring agricultural items from quarantine zones.
